London, 8 June 2017: In collaboration with associated partners, UP Projects is delighted to reveal full details of a specially-curated film programme to be shown on *The Floating Cinema*, during its eight-part tour across the waterways in Yorkshire and North Lincolnshire (1 July - 13 August 2017).

This year's film programme 'In Dialogue' has been curated in response to UP Projects' major new artistic commission *On the Bench* by Harry Meadley. This new artwork will be unveiled in eight stages during *The Floating Cinema's* tour. *On the Bench* features themes of perseverance, determination and dedication and the corresponding film programme highlights these themes through stories covering a range of topics such as sport, music, art and dance.

Encompassing more than 15 films, 'In Dialogue' features films from nine countries worldwide, including Saudi Arabia, New Zealand, Niger, Iran, Ireland, Poland, Italy, Germany, the UK and the USA. From award-winning, ground-breaking feature films, to celebrated documentaries and biopics, 'In Dialogue' echoes the themes of Meadley's new work, presenting a number of avenues through which audiences can engage with the entire programme.

The films featured within 'In Dialogue' are united through fascinating stories of inspiring individuals finding their way against the backdrop of their own cultural

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traditions, society and personal circumstances. True accounts of individuals who rose to stardom; singer Darlene Love and internationally recognised dance choreographer Pina Bausch, are contrasted against lesser known stories of others' struggle to achieve success. The programme looks at the determination of individuals who pursue an activity, be it art, dance or music and how tradition and cultural barriers can be challenged through such mediums.

As part of 'In Dialogue', and in partnership with A Kind of Seeing, Hull Independent Cinema, Film Hub North and Hull City of Culture, *The Floating Cinema* will be hosting a screening of 'Following the Fleet: DRIFTERS' with live music from sound artist Jason Singh in Hull Marina on 10th August 2017.

In addition to the film programme, UP Projects have partnered with local arts organisations across the tour stops to curate an associated series of events, which will see *The Floating Cinema* transform in each location, becoming a site for exhibitions, one-off events, screenings and education initiatives.

Emma Underhill, Founding Director of UP Projects commented: 'For this final iteration of *The Floating Cinema*, we are proud to present a broad, international programme of films celebrating the numerous ways that the arts and culture can breakdown barriers within society.'

Annabel Grundy, Manager, Film Hub North, said: 'The Transformative Film Culture for Hull project is about ensuring Hull film fans can enjoy the widest range of cinematic stories from all over the world. We are delighted to see a Yorkshire tour of floating films as part of this year's celebrations. *The Floating Cinema* combines unique film programming - from documentaries to family films to Hollywood Classics and archive interpretations - with fun pop up events.'

Martin Green, Director of Hull 2017, added: 'We are delighted that *The Floating Cinema* is finishing this year's tour in Hull this August, adding to an exciting summer and a great year of film for the city. With Harry Meadley's film series taking inspiration from the region and Hull's beautiful marina as a backdrop, it promises to be a fascinating and highly evocative event.'

Damien Greco, Programming Director at Hull Independent Cinema, said: 'Hull Independent Cinema has overseen an incredible line up of imaginative film projects in the city this year. *The Floating Cinema* project is going to see audiences come together for a really unique series of summer events and access a set of films which continue to push the boundaries of how we access film and our surroundings. '

On the Bench is a commission by UP Projects for The Floating Cinema.

The commission and The Floating Cinema are supported by Arts Council England's Strategic Touring Programme, BFI, Film Hub North, Esmée Fairbairn Foundation, Canal & River Trust, Hull City Council and is part of Hull UK City of Culture 2017's year-long film programme.

The film programme is devised in collaboration with Hull Independent Cinema. A programme of talks, events and activities will be delivered in partnership with Artlink; Crafts Council & Humber Street Gallery; The Ropewalk; Rotherham Open Arts Renaissance; Site Gallery, Sheffield; Swinton Lock Activity Centre; Junction; The Point; and Yorkshire Waterways Museum.

UP Projects curates and commissions contemporary art for public places; engaging citizens of London, the UK and across the globe. We support artists to make new work that has social relevance, encourages learning and enriches the public sphere. Made up of a highly-experienced team of strategic thinkers, curators, educators and project managers we also produce cultural and place making strategies. Our approach is artist-led, community centred and involves collaboration with multiple partners. Led by Founding Director Emma Underhill since 2002 we are the only public art organisation in London to be awarded National Portfolio status by Arts Council England in 2011 and became a registered charity in 2017.

The Floating Cinema is an award-winning structure conceived and commissioned by UP Projects and designed by Duggan Morris Architects. The structure is a mechanism through which artists' films, independent cinema and archive footage can be brought outside of the gallery or cinema space and presented in public locations along the UK's waterways. Alongside a programme of screenings, the vessel has been used to host talks, performances, workshops and events for audiences across the country. On the Bench is a new commission for the 6th and final iteration of The Floating Cinema. Previous seasons have included Extra-Ordinary, Extra-International, Extra-Terrestrial and The Floating Cinema On Tour from London to Bristol. The Floating Cinema was built with support from The Legacy List with corporate partner Bloomberg as part of Bloomberg East in partnership with the Canal & River Trust and is a legacy of the London 2012 Olympic Games.

Harry Meadley's On the Bench

Composed of a series of eight short films, this context-specific artwork spotlights the nuances and creative diversity of South and East Yorkshire and North Lincolnshire. Developed and created with participants living or working in the eight locations where *The Floating Cinema* will present its programme, *On the Bench* features interviews with individuals who articulate how these places influence and inspire them. At each



tour stop, one or more of Meadley's episodes will be released, either through outdoor canal-side screenings or via intimate on-board presentations. Each episode will then be published online at www.upprojects.com and be free to view.

BFI, Film Hub North

The BFI is funding 'Transformative Film Culture For Hull', as part of its National Lottery-funded BFI Film Audience Network and led by its lead partner BFI Film Hub North. Delivered through Hull 2017 and by Hull Independent Cinema and a unique partnership of film festival, educational and archive partners from across the north, the film programme will bring a packed programme of more than 400 screenings, one-off events and film festivals throughout the year to Hull and the region. The programme reflects the BFI's activities across the UK to bring film to audiences where there is less opportunity for them to experience and engage in film, and to support local film networks and audience initiatives. Hull City Council

In 2013, Hull City Council led the bid for UK City of Culture status in collaboration with the city's cultural, business, community organisations and artists and with overwhelming public support. The decision to bid came as part of the City Plan set out by Hull's City Leadership Board in 2013 to transform the city over ten years, creating 7,500 jobs. One of the key ambitions of the City Plan is to harness the power of culture and the arts to make Hull a world-class visitor destination, with hosting UK City of Culture 2017 being a key milestone on the journey. 20 November 2013, the day Hull achieved UK City of Culture status, was widely hailed as 'the day the city changed forever'. Following the announcement, Hull City Council established an independent company to deliver the 2017 cultural programme, providing an initial investment of £4m, appointing Rosie Millard as Chair and Martin Green as CEO and Director. The Council also accelerated the delivery of a £100m cultural capital programme that is now transforming the city and its cultural venues. Hull's year as the nation's cultural capital is expected to deliver a £60 million economic impact in 2017 alone and attract one million additional visitors to the city.
