Monica Ali delivers a brief talk that explores these issues, and seeks to answer the question: what is fiction for? She will also be reading from her work, and taking questions from the audience.

Monica Ali is an award-winning, bestselling writer whose novels include *Brick Lane*, *In the Kitchen* and *Untold Story*. She was chosen as one of Granta's 2003 Best of Young British Novelists. Her work has been translated into 26 languages, and she has judged a number of literary prizes including as Chair of the International Man Booker. She is a Fellow of the RSA and of the Orwell Prize, and she is currently Distinguished Writer in Residence at the University of Surrey.

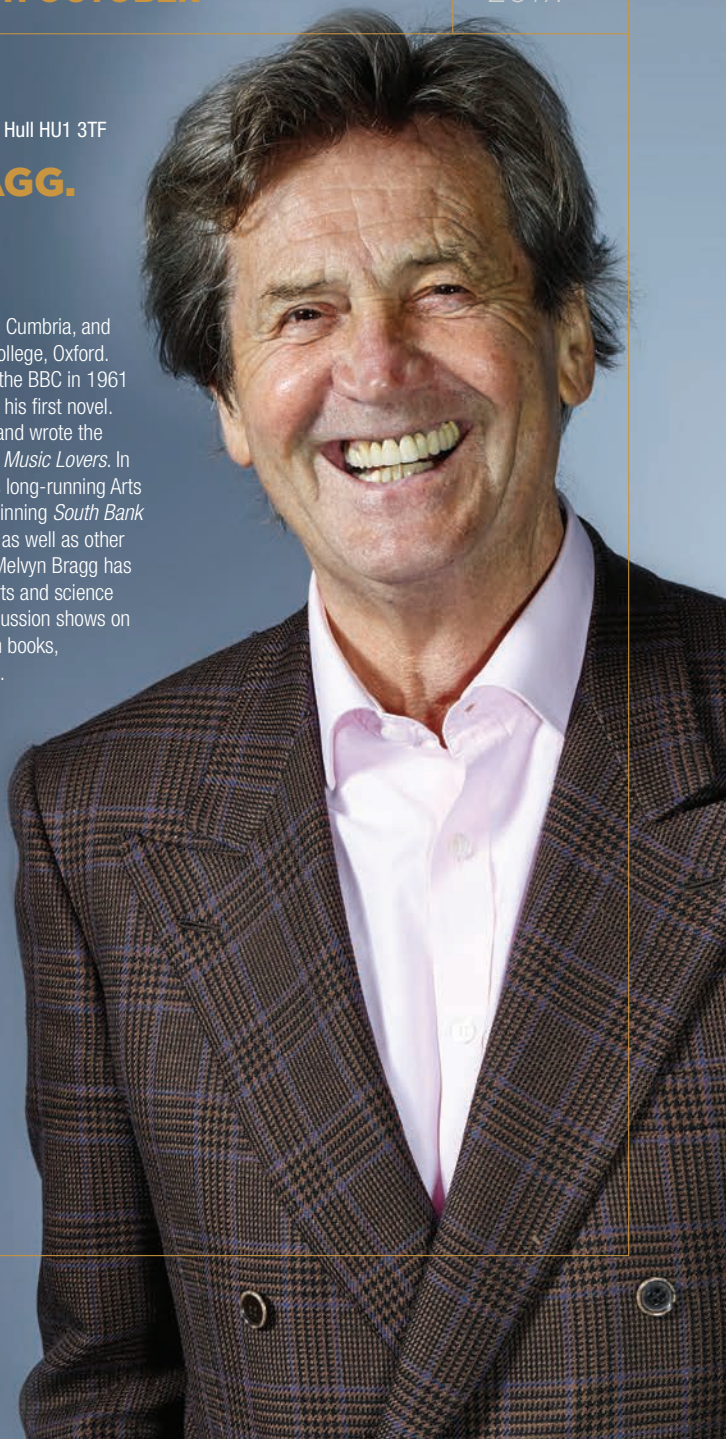
## MELVYN BRAGG.

Melvyn Bragg was born in Wigton, Cumbria, and educated there and at Wadham College, Oxford. His broadcasting career began at the BBC in 1961 and soon afterwards he published his first novel. He collaborated with Ken Russell and wrote the 1970 film about Tchaikovsky, *The Music Lovers*. In 1977 Melvyn Bragg started LWT's long-running Arts programme, the multiple award-winning *South Bank Show*, making about 750 editions as well as other documentaries. In the meantime Melvyn Bragg has expanded his range, presenting arts and science programmes and marshalling discussion shows on BBC Radio, and writing non-fiction books, and several award-winning novels. He is an Honorary Fellow of the Royal Society and of The British Academy, and was given a Peerage in 1998.

The novel tells the story of Cass Williams, a fictional singer who had great success in the early 1970s, only to retire mysteriously at the height of her fame. Decades later, she decides to put

together a Greatest Hits album which causes her to reflect on her past. Laura says "It was clear to me that I wanted my character's musical output to have a life beyond the page." This desire led to the collaboration with Mercury Prize nominated singer-songwriter Kathryn Williams and the eponymous accompanying album to the novel *Greatest Hits*. This promises to be a great evening for fans of literature and music alike, with Laura reading from the novel and Kathryn performing songs relating to each reading.

Laura Barnett's debut novel *The Versions of Us* was a number one best seller with over 200,000 copies sold in the UK alone. Kathryn has enjoyed an 18 year career, having recently written songs inspired by Sylvia Plath's *The Bell Jar* which received much critical acclaim.

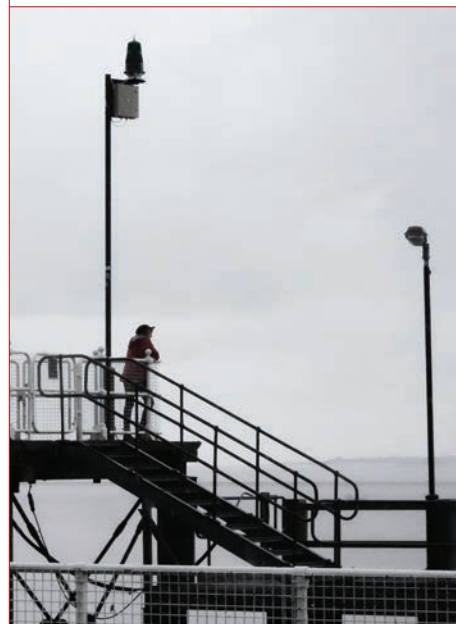

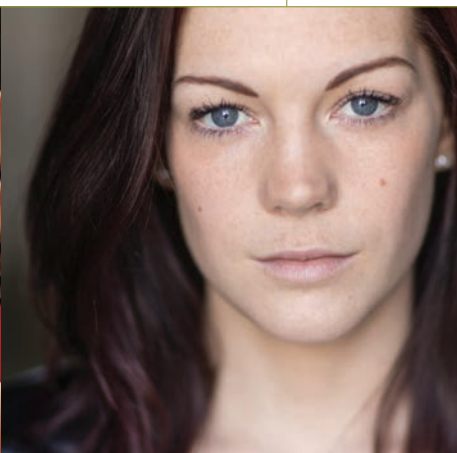
