Following a three month residency at Turner Contemporary, Margate, Shape Arts and Artlink present a solo exhibition of works by Oliver MacDonald. Traditionally trained as a willow weaver, Oliver explores craft through a conceptual lens creating large-scale, performative objects and installations.



ANITA CORBIN PREVIEW-6TH JULY 6-8PM 7TH JULY - 30TH AUGUST

An exhibition that reunites women with their adolescent self. It explores the ways in which photography can help reveal how we feel about, and reflect upon, our identity and society at the various stages in our lives. It also looks at the power of belonging and belief - within the tribe of subculture

Visible Girls was the project when Anita was 21 years old. 28 double portraits of female skins, mods, punks, rockabillies, New Romantics, young lesbians and rastas all out in their cultural clans in the clubs, pubs, friends' homes and social centres where they hung out and discussed politics, fashion and music. The images were groundbreaking at the time and toured the UK.

The next wave of the Project so far 35 years later, Anita Corbin realised she was wondering what had happened to all those women who were so fervently dedicated to their subcultural tribes. As a photographer she was also in a retrospective phase and had started another project - portraits of inspirational women firsts - and wanted to fuel this with the energy of previous projects.

Curiosity prompted her. She was fascinated to know how sociologically and historically the lives of all women had changed with the impact of the last 35 years - and realised she could do it through the lives of these individual girls. How had their stories panned out? Did that scowling party girl now have three teenage kids? Was that skinhead now a 45-year-old office worker leading a simple life? Was that punk a yoga teacher?

Interpretation

With Visible Girls: Revisited, we want the audience to connect to the aspirational aspect of exploring your own identity when the world is your oyster and the desire to be part of a culture or a group...And then, how that identity, that yearning, has been fulfilled (or not) once adolescence has been left behind.

SQUARE PEG

In October 2017 Artlink will host a diversity learning conference. This event will take place over two days and will include training, artist talks and interactive events. We will cover a range of issues including the social model of disability, the 2010 equality act, LGBT mental health, and more.

The conference is ideal for artists, arts organisations, and individuals to come along and learn more about how to create accessible arts events.

DYSLEXIA PORTRAIT

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Dyslexia is a very diverse condition, affecting approximately one in ten adults in the UK. Not all people with dyslexia experience it in the same way. The Dyslexia portrait by Miranda Harr is a photographic project which will explore and challenge our ideas of how people with dyslexia see the world. Miranda has invited people with dyslexia to collaborate with her, in producing a series of abstract and creative photographic images which will represent the diversity of the dyslexic experience, and show how people with dyslexia see words, letters, shapes and how they overcome the problems and frustrations they face.
