This live exchange and collaboration will challenge ideas, and will support you in developing your own artistic practice. There will be opportunities to discuss how students may react and create work in similar ways connected to your own teaching. We would like the Exchange to continue in your place of work, engaging with your own students, and therefore are offering a bursary to all participants to develop or lead a creative exchange of their own.

TURNER PRIZE 2017

Turner Prize, one of the world's most renowned art prizes, is awarded by Tate to an artist who has exhibited outstanding work in the previous year. The four shortlisted artists for 2017 will exhibit their work at the Ferens Art Gallery, Hull, from September with the overall winner announced in early December.

Working across a broad range of media which includes film, painting and installation, Turner Prize 2017 exhibition will provide diverse experiences and voices to illustrate the way that art is able to reflect upon and challenge the world.

Through genres such as portraiture, landscape and still life, the four artists explore how art is able to respond to political and social upheaval.

THE SHORTLISTED ARTISTS

Hurvin Anderson's paintings encompass both portraiture and landscape to distil a sense of place, with works that shift between representation and reality.

Andrea Büttner's multifaceted works, which operate across print, installation and painting, explore the language of poverty and value.

Lubaina Himid's work references the political power of graphic language, with decorative motifs often used to confront the sense of invisibility felt by the people of the African Diaspora.

Rosalind Nashashibi uses time in film to build a steady yet often repetitive picture of everyday experience, through footage that combines movement and stillness.



FOR YOUR STUDENTS

Bringing your students to visit Turner Prize 2017 this term is a once in a lifetime opportunity to view the exhibition as it takes residence in Hull during the UK City of Culture year. The contemporary art world will be shining a spotlight on Hull, giving your students the opportunity to explore four diverse contemporary artists' work - and right on your door step.

There is a range of ways in which you can be involved - whether that's visiting the exhibition during normal opening hours to lead a discussion about the work you see, or getting involved with one of the specialist programmes that has been established to help students with their learning whilst the prize is in town.

ARTICULATE

Great artists, new and old, have found inspiration in the many galleries around the world. We want young artists in Hull to have that experience too. We are encouraging all students to sit and sketch in the gallery, to dwell in the spaces a little bit longer and to start a conversation with their friend about the work they are looking at.

Our Articulate guide can help them do all of these things. It can be attached to students' sketch books to prompt their sketchbook drawing and skills as they wander through the galleries. Questions are aimed at improving enquiry skill, so no prior knowledge is required. Ideal for Art & Design students.
