When Picasso comes to stay anything can happen!

Come and play on the farm with Tony and Picasso. We'll have loads of fun, make crazy pictures and tell the true story of how a young boy became friends with one of the greatest artists who ever lived.

Storytelling, music and puppetry combine with chances to make your own art in this hands-on and hilarious interactive family show for 4 years and up.

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Some background information

Tony is the son of photographer and model Lee Miller and surrealist artist Roland Penrose. During the 1950's their home at Farley Farm in Sussex was a magnet for many leading artists (Joan Miró, Man Ray, Richard Hamilton to name a few). It's there, at the age of 3, that he left a toothy reminder on Picasso's arm. It was a friendship that lasted many years, and Tony (all grown up) now runs his parents house as an art gallery, archive, museum and working farm!

His book 'The Boy Who Bit Picasso', was published in 2010, and uses his mothers' photographs and a selection of Picasso works to tell the story. Taking inspiration from the book, Untied Artists bring the story to life, encouraging young audiences to have a go at creating their own masterpieces along the way.

Production details

- The show premiered at Oxford Playhouse's BT Studio in March 2015. It is the company's second collaboration with OP, following the hugely successful site-specific show 'The Story of the Four Minute Mile' in 2012.
- The show is designed to work in a variety of contexts and settings. In Spring 2015 it
 toured to small-scale theatres, libraries, village halls, schools, contemporary art galleries and
 children's theatres. It received great feedback from venues, critics and audiences young
 and old.
- There are 3 performers onstage (plus 1 technical manager in theatre venues)
- We can be **technically self sufficient** in all venues, but use lights and sound in venues which have them. **Get in min 2.5 hrs. Get out min 1 hour.**
- The **stage set up is intimate**, young audience sat around a floorcloth, with parents/carers behind them. Capacity for the show is dependent on venue and staff support

Audience Capacity

The following audience size and space guidelines are crucial to the smooth running of the show and the audience experience. Please take special note of these.

- Ideal dimensions (including audience) 10m long x 8m wide x 2.5 high
- Absolute Minimum dimensions 7.5m long x 6m wide x 2.5 high
- For larger audiences we must have the larger size or above
- The recommended age range is 4-8 years, but children up to 11 years will enjoy the
 content and relate to the 'going to big school' narrative elements. There is plenty to enjoy for
 adult audiences, indeed some of the most successful shows of the Spring15 run were those
 with the widest age range.
- A free teachers pack is available to aid wraparound learning for KS1 Arts curriculum.
- We aim to attract mid-week audiences by working closely with education and marketing teams to target schools. By offering the education pack to schools well in advance of the performances, children can engage with weekly arts activities that build up interest and draw focus to their forthcoming trip to the theatre. We are confident it is an offer schools will want to take up.









About the company

Untied Artists' create performance that is characterised by its' singularity, intimacy, musicality and heartfelt storytelling. The company is run by Jake Oldershaw and Jo Carr from Birmingham UK. For this show they collaborated with Gary Winters of Lone Twin, Puppet pioneers Creature Encounter, and a host of other fantastic creatives.
