WHO WAS BASIL KIRCHIN?

What connects the first British rock'n'roll discs of the 1950s, Vincent Price and *The Abominable Dr. Phibes*, the Nagra tape recorder and the industrial sounds of the north? The answer is Basil Kirchin.

Basil Kirchin is the forgotten genius of post-war British music. His remarkable life stretched from the days when British dance music mutated into rock'n'roll, through a headlong succession of film scores and pop songwriting, before retreating to Hull, where he created sonic landscapes that still challenge convention while seeking out an increasingly reclusive existence until his death in 2005.

A pioneer of musique concrète described by Brian Eno as "a founding father of ambient", Kirchin's intriguing history represents a collision of popular and experimental musical cultures that predate and define much of the music we hear today.



WE START COUNTING: SEAN O'HAGAN & FRIENDS + TWO AND TWO ARE ONE

Founding member of The High Llamas, Sean O'Hagan, pays homage to the lyrical side of Basil Kirchin's work with a specially convened ensemble, which includes vocalist Jane Weaver as well as other friends, whose collective background embraces Stereolab, Sun Ra, Jarvis Cocker and more.

Inspiration comes from *I Start Counting*, a song composed for the 1969 film of the same name.

Support comes from Hull's own Liam van Rijn, also known as Revenu, who premieres a set of live and electronic music creating a seamless blend of Kirchin's sounds with his own.

Please note that the cost of the ticket for We Start Counting includes The Abominable Dr. Phibes film screening and live performance by Alexander Hawkins.

With its art deco sets, dark humour, exemplary cast and Basil Kirchin soundtrack, *The Abominable Dr. Phibes* (Dir: Robert Fuest, 1971) is a cult classic.

This quintessential British horror film follows the title character, Dr Phibes (Vincent Price) – a theologian and musician – who believes incompetent doctors killed his wife and plots his revenge using methods inspired by the Old Testament's *Ten Plagues of Egypt*.

Supported by the BFI, this film screening will be accompanied by live music from keyboard specialist Alexander Hawkins, played on the mighty Hull City Hall pipe organ.

Manipulating Kirchin's work in and out of recognisability, maverick improvisers Evan Parker, Matt Wright, Adam Linson and Spring Heel Jack create an unforgettable sonic experience.

Hidden Orchestra, the brainchild of composer/ producer Acheson, has performed sold out gigs in Edinburgh, London, Prague, Moscow, Athens and Istanbul. This live show mixes dark orchestral textures with field recordings, bass, and layers of drums and percussion... a hip new perspective on the methodology employed by Basil Kirchin.

Goldfrapp's Will Gregory curates a programme that responds and reacts to Kirchin's fascination with texture and sonic collage.

In a series of pieces specially devised for the occasion, St. Etienne's Bob Stanley and Pete Wiggs create Abstractions of Holderness, an audio-visual work inspired by Kirchin's 1970s residency in East Yorkshire. Sonic Youth's Jim O'Rourke responds to his favourite Kirchin piece Integration and Will Gregory explores the potential of the human voice. While pianist and composer Matthew Bourne opens the concert with a highly individual take on Kirchin's world.

This concert will be recorded for future broadcast on BBC Radio 3's Hear and Now.
